PROJECT | purpose and opportunity

- 1. Creation of 5 visual tours (virtual and video) for visitor use via the Website and mobile/tablets using scripts provided by Hyde 900.
 - a. The history and architecture of the abbey (the Abbot Aston tour) (by October 2017) (Edward Fennel & Nigel Bradshaw)
 - b. The life of the Monks (Series of Ten Anecdotes spoken by Nigel Bradshaw) (by October 2017)
 - c. Photo Tour video compiled of stills (October 2017) (David Spurling)
 - d. Contemporary Video Tour (guided current day video tour) (October 2017) (David Spurling)
 - e. Audio Tour (October 2017) (David Spurling)
- 2. The setting up/creation of a localised server within the precincts of the abbey (possibly the Gateway area or one of the neighbouring buildings) as the basis of a digital infrastructure across the site (by October 2017)

OBJECTIVE | what does the project work to achieve?

- 1. Creation and development of the QR points / beacons. Breaking the tours into sections relating to each separate part of the individual tours and QR point for visitors to view on mobile devices. Review whether Tours can be interchangeable ie choice of any of the tours at a particular QR point
- 2. Providing QR points as working icons ready for printed material/banners/posters around the Hyde site
- 3. Tours playable from the website (YouTube Channel possibly, linked from HAKA website)
- 4. Tours provided as full tours (and segments) for downloading from HAKA website to mobile devices
- 5. The provision of a server for hosting the digital content and the HAKA website

- Project Lead (Debs) = 198 hrs (approx. 25 x 8 hr days) costed by the University for funding by HLF Funding (£7178.66 + VAT)
- 3D build & development of site in Unreal Game Engine for making interactive = 336 hrs (42 days)
- Research of buildings, materials & interiors = 80 hrs (10 days)
- Student input for the above build, development & creation of video/virtual tours = 850 hrs (approx. 106 days)
- Meetings with Hyde 900

The above schedule is based on providing abbey detail for only the points determined, not a full detailed abbey for 'any' view - the areas not covered in the points will show as basic shaded model only. The schedule will also depend on the level of detail required, the amount of overlay information required, and the time taken for provision of information.

BUDGET

The work already completed in many areas, plus many hours have been provided for free by the University of Winchester's Digital Media students and staff over the last 2-3 years. Resources such as 3D models (animals, people, buildings, carts, boats (for quarrying stone animation/stills) have been purchased personally by Debs Wilson and should be recompensed from HLF funding/the University fee.

The funding will be used to pay selected students working on the Hyde 900 digital project over the University's Spring & Summer 2017 break.

158 days (excluding Debs Wilson (3D interactive abbey) & Paul Wilson's (website) time), will be split over 4-5 students working with Debs and Paul over the summer. The students will be working on the 3D site and the augmented reality tours (building/editing content).

The students who are willing and able to work on the project are currently confirmed as Alastair Hodges (graduated BA DM Design student, now Masters DM Practice in Architectural Visualisation student), Will Rudd-Clarke (graduating BA DM Design student), Reina Lung (graduating BA DM Design student). We have yet to confirm the last two places, although very aware we will need at least one developer familiar with AR development, and another student working in video editing/compositing.

The work completed and time provided by Debs Wilson and Paul Wilson (approx. 35-40 days) is therefore not funded, i.e. in kind. This means that the team working with Hyde 900 cannot provide 'additional elements' to those already quoted for the HLF funding bid as part of this HLF funded project with Hyde 900.



4. The Life of the Monks / History of New Minster/Hyde Abbey in ten events— Anecdotal series Tour (Edward & Nigel)

- 4.1. These could be the subject of the 2-3 minute stories which illustrate the history of the abbey:
 - 4.1.1. c.900 King Alfred's death and the establishment of New Minster
 - 4.1.2. c.960 New Minster is refounded with a Royal Charter from King Edgar and Benedictine monks arrive from
 - 4.1.3. c.1030 King Cnut favours the church and gives it a gold cross; Queen Emma gives it an important relic in the head of St. Valentine
 - 4.1.4. c.1066 The uncle of King Harold is abbot of New Minster and he goes with a number of monks to take part in the Battle of Hastings. They do not return and New Minster accommodates itself to Norman rulers
 - 4.1.5. c.1110 The move from New Minster to Hyde and the establishment of the new abbey
 - 4.1.6. c.1135 Winchester falls victim to the civil war between Stephen and Matilda and the abbey is burned down
 - 4.1.7. c.1220 Abbot Aston is elected to be abbot
 - 4.1.8. c.1225 Abbot Aston goes to London to witness the reissue of Magna Carta
 - 4.1.9. c.1350 The Black Death devastates the abbey and its estates
 - 4.1.10. c.1538 The abbey is dissolved

4.2. Abbot Aston's Anecdotes Of Monastic Life - Anecdote Sample - a basis for possible adaptation/development by Nigel, The Slow Readers Club – 2 mins (which of the 10 does this belong to?)

"I want to let you into a rather embarrassing secret. My monks – the monks of Hyde Abbe – were not always the brightest. I was pretty bright myself – but I was the exception rather than the rule. Most of the bright boys from Winchester and roundabouts were sent by their parents to join the monastery attached to the cathedral. Well they would wouldn't they! We on the other hand tended to recruit what you might call the less able.

Anyway, this came to the attention of the Bishop during one of his regular inspections. He was not impressed when he heard the monks reading aloud from the Holy Bible – and, as you know, we do quite a lot of that in the abbey - it's what we're about. So when he heard not one monk but several mispronouncing words, stumbling over them and giving a completely garbled version of the parables he said we had to take action.

The problem was that the abbot at that time was not much interested in education. He just assumed that the lads who arrived at Hyde had been taught to read and write and he was damned if he was going to do anything more about it. But that didn't satisfy the Bishop. He insisted that the abbey get hold of a proper teacher to provide what they call remedial reading instruction to youngsters when they arrived so that the word of God could be properly disseminated. He put it rather poetically, I think. Through education, he said, "They remove the scales (from their eyes) and the clouds of ignorance and, being more perfectly educated, understand and recognise what they are reading and are brought to a clearer contemplation of the mysteries of the scriptures - as happens with nimbler minds."

'Nimbler minds' – I like that! He properly put us in our place. Mind you, he had a point. Most of our novices preferred throwing the dice to reading a book."

4.3. Abbot Aston Anecdotes 3 - 'Bread Of Heaven' (which of the 10 does this belong to?)

Just before I became Abbot here in Hyde in 1222 there was a big council held near Oxford by Stephen Langton, the archbishop of Canterbury. If it been a few months later I should have been there – but there you go, I missed it. Anyway it was very important for the church here in England because after it was over the good archbishop issued what's called the Oxford Constitution – a statement of detailed laws basically about how the church should be run.

Among many rules – too many to mention here – it talked about food in monasteries and the need to enforce strictly the rules on eating. After all Christ said 'Man does not live by bread alone' - and who could disagree with that? So we shouldn't give too much attention to what we eat so long as we survive healthily. As Christ asked God, 'Give us our daily bread'. Not five star suppers – but just daily bread.

Now according to the rule of Benedict each monk should have a pound of bread a day. Again as the rule says, "There must be no danger of overeating so that no monk is overtaken by indigestion – there is nothing so opposed to Christian life as overeating."

That said, there was always to be a choice of two dishes - or three with vegetables. So that sounds pretty fair wouldn't you say?

Sad to report it wasn't good enough for some of the monks who came after me. They forgot all about the rules. For a start many of them didn't stay in the monastery to eat their mid-day meals at all. Most days, three quarters of them were off in the town in hostelries or with friends – and who knows what they were served there! As usual when this came to the ears of the bishop he was furious. He said that if monks did not keep to the rules then in the future they should 'Go hungry, with only servants' portions of bread and vegetables'. Hmm – I'm not sure what the servants felt about that! - but it did lead to some thinner monks.
